From the President...

I am happy to report that HCEA won our Use of Facilities grievance. This important victory will prevent HCPS from forcing HCEA Representatives, UniServ, HCEA staff and myself from completing Use of Facilities forms when we schedule building level meetings within schools. No HCEA representative should complete these forms for building level meetings. If you are asked by your principal to complete a Use of Facilities form please contact HCEA.

I am also pleased to report that The MSEA RA voted to support local efforts to advocate for paid child rearing and family medical leave. HCEA will begin advocating both locally and statewide for this important benefit for workers. No one should be forced to sacrifice their financial security due to illness or child birth. MSEA and HCEA have lead on many other civil and workers rights issues. We will lead on this as well.

The fight against standardized testing is taking off. Parents, legislators and teachers alike are advocating for reductions in testing and elimination of pointless standardized tests. This week, initial results for the PARCC were released. The Baltimore Sun reported that more than half of students Maryland were below expectations. Click here to read the article. Assessment 101 teaches that a test which over half the students fail is a flawed test. We must fight to change or end PARCC testing. A day after the PARCC results were released, NEAP results were also released. The NEAP showed declines in both Reading and Math scores. Click here to read the article. In response to legislation spearheaded by MSEA, Governor Hogan has appoint a panel to examine over-testing in Maryland. We are fortunate to have one of our members on the panel. Laura Potter, Harford County Teacher of the Year, will serve as one of the appointees examining testing in Maryland. I am hopeful that this panel will make recommendations which reduce the ridiculous amount of time teachers are spending on pointless, redundant and inane assessments.

According to a <u>2014 Baltimore Sun article</u>, HCPS requires among the most locally mandated testing in Maryland. To help in the fight to end over-testing, HCEA has formed a

Know Your Contract

8.10 Planning Periods. Teachers in secondary schools shall receive not less than 225 minutes of unassigned planning time on a weekly basis and shall be scheduled for one unassigned planning period per day of not less than forty-five (45) consecutive minutes. Neither this provision, nor 8.8 below will apply during times when the normal school schedule must be adjusted during emergencies; or in cases when an individual teacher has requested in writing to teach more than the usual number of periods for teachers in that subject in that school. or in the case of a teacher who volunteers for other school activities during the scheduled unassigned planning period.

8.11 The unassigned planning time provided on a weekly basis for elementary teachers shall not be less than 225 minutes. Classroom and special education teachers in elementary schools shall be scheduled for unassigned planning time during the regular day for students in increments of not less than forty five (45) consecutive minutes per day. All other elementary teachers shall be scheduled for unassigned planning time during the duty day in increments not less than forty five (45) consecutive minutes per day.


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
